Greetings Easter people in the name of the Risen Christ,

*“Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

This we will proclaim on Pentecost Sunday, May 23rd. The Season of Easter culminates on the fiftieth day, Pentecost (“the fifty”) with the continued celebration of the Spirit of the resurrected Jesus poured upon us to sustain us the church to rejoice, proclaim, love and serve the world.

Turn off the TV, Put down the newspaper and magazines, Set the cell phone on silence, and invest 5 minutes in your Family with these 5 simple steps

1. **SHARE** highs & lows of the day
2. **READ** and highlight a verse of Scripture in your Bible
3. **TALK** about how the verse relates to your highs & lows
4. **PRAY** for your highs & lows, for your family, and for the world
5. **BLESS** one another

The FAITH 5 (Faith Acts In The Home)

Care to have some fun, keep your family communicating every night, and grow in your understanding of yourself and God? Try this simple five-step process for the next eight weeks and see if it doesn't help! Here's how you do it: Whoever is going to bed first in your home calls "FAITH 5" or "Huddle Up!" Everyone must drop what they're doing, turn off the television, put down the newspaper or their homework, set the cell phone on silence and gather in a room of the convener's choice. Then take turns going through these five simple steps:

You want a great relationship with your kids? You want openness, honesty, caring and sharing in your family? You want to raise a child to be a strong, thoughtful, empathetic, positive, healthy adult out in the world some day? You can't buy that. You have to invest in it. And the investment is the most expensive currency you own – your TIME – aimed at that most precious young person in your life.

Kids spell love TIME. Be intentional. Be consistent. Be caring. Be the parent. Every night. Every home. No one else can do that for you.

Five Questions

1. **For Parents of Young Children:** What would it be worth to you to have a teenager some day who won't go to sleep without talking to you about their day? Praying with you? Blessing you? Would it be worth five minutes? To night? Every night?
2. **For Parents of Pre-Teens:** What would happen to your family over time if you were able to keep this open, caring communication going every night throughout adolescence?
3. **For Parents of Teenagers:** Once the teen years begin and drivers' licences come into play, communication between parents and teens can become a challenge. How might this type of five-minute conversation change a family if they were intentional and consistent about it? Would the benefits outweigh the hassle of trying to invest this time of care, listening, and prayer each night in your home? Why or why not?
4. **For couples:** What would happen to you as a couple over the course of several months if your relationship deepened and you got to know each others dreams. What would happen if in the midst of your busy lives if you spent at least 5 minutes each day focused on listening, caring for each others needs and praying together for each other and for your life together as a couple?
5. **Church Leaders:** What would happen to a family and the entire congregation over time if they made an intentional point of doing the Faith 5 most every night? What would happen to your church five years from today if the majority of your households were doing active listening, scripture, faith talk, prayer, and blessings every night?

Thoughts For The Month

Earth Day was on April 22nd but isn't it (or should be) everyday? Acts 2:43-47 *"Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the good will of all people."* We must pray, therefore, for the strength to change our personal and public lives in the end that there may be enough—ELCA Social Statement from Caring For Creation. An ancient Indian proverb (Chief Seattle) *"Treat the earth well: it was not given to you by your parents, it was loaned to you by your children. We do not inherit the earth from our ancestors, we borrow it from our children."* Leo Rosten once wrote that *"the purpose of life is to matter, to be productive, to have it make a difference that you have lived at all, using the talents that God has given you for the betterment of others."* OK—so Earth day is everyday and we have a responsibility, but I'm only one person. What I can do seems so ineffective. Every paper, every TV program, every magazine nags about something, doesn't it? Think of one raindrop—by itself it doesn't do much, but have a few more coming down and something happens. Hey, don't everyone rush out with good intentions of "doing" and create a flood—just try to make consistent changes with caring as you can. So many facets in our lives can use change—major or minor.

Sharing a few of those droplets: are you aware of the "Pacific Garbage Patch"? It's a vortex of marine litter located within the North Pacific Gyre (your new word for today), one of five major oceanic graves. About 1,000 miles west of California, the Patch is estimated to be twice the size of Texas. Estimates are that 80% of the garbage comes from land based sources (Who? Us?) and 20% from ships at sea. Nearly 90% of this floating junk is plastic and durable. For each item to biodegrade in that water environment, it takes: paper towels—2 to 4 weeks; apple core—2 months; cigarettes—1 to 5 years; plastic bags/wrappers—10-20 years; Styrofoam cups—50 years; balloons/Mylar—100+ years; plastic bottles—450 years; fishing lines—600 years; aluminum cans—200 years. Plastics technically do not biodegrade completely as they just break down into smaller and smaller pieces that persist and act like sponges for toxic chemicals. Humans dump (via wind and runoff) approximately 14 billion pounds of garbage in the world's oceans each year.

That's ocean. How about around home? Your garbage disposal not only uses electricity but the ground up matter travels to a wastewater plant where more fuel and water are used to treat, process and filter the waste—then on to the Sound. We are continuously encouraged to recycle and do we have the bins! I'm wondering how the contents of the food waste bin is going to hold up on the summer heat. But at least something is

keeping it being preserved in the land fill as when they finally do begin to decompose anaerobically (without air) in a dump, the greenhouse gas, methane, is produced. Composting is an aerobic process exposing the stuff to air, it only produces carbon dioxide—and some good soil additive for whatever you have in your yard. If the average family composted regularly, or put food scraps in their yard waste container to be composted, each household would prevent about 30 pounds of methane emissions per year, the equivalent of around 620 pounds of carbon dioxide. Each person in the U.S. throws away approximately 4.5 pounds of waste each day, totaling 231.9 million tons of municipal solid waste. Food scraps were about 11.2% of that land fill waste amounting to 25.9 million tons of food waste produced back, when?

There's a small start for your creation care challenge. Immediate: try to reduce the amount of processed food you eat. Summer's coming, farmer's markets opening, your garden's beginning to produce. That's another story. Use your mugs to drink wherever you are, and use a permanent water bottle (even helps keeping the BPA's from you and the children). Also, imagine a 100 ft. Douglas fir tree—that's about how much each of us uses in paper and wood products—try 100% recycled paper as often as possible.

Change of thought: the way to give to God is to give to others. He's fixed it so givers have more fun than takers. Mother's Day is coming up and celebrate mom and other women who have inspired you. Present them with a Northwest Harvest gift card, showing you, in turn, are making a difference in another's life. Proceeds from Northwest Harvest gift cards toward feeding the hungry in our state, 40% of whom are children. Just place an order and make a donation and they will send personalized cards for you, noting you have made a gift in her name. 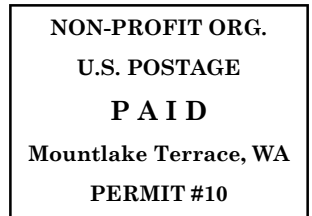
