Grace Notes

Dear Ones,

This Lent we have begun to study the ways that racism has shaped us individually, institutionally, and systemically. We are NOT just reading a statement at the beginning of worship acknowledging that we DO occupy the ancestral lands of the Coast Salish peoples. We are not just SAYING that we are "committed to being better listeners, learners, and to lifting indigenous voices." We're beginning to put those words into practice. It starts by educating ourselves.

On our most recent parochial report (an annual filing with the NW-WA Synod & ELCA) we listed 40 members. On the line where we list how many persons of color are members, we had to (again) write zero. The ELCA is described as "the whitest denomination in the US." If we don't educate ourselves as white people on the ways that we have benefited due to that skin color, we are turning our eyes, ears, hands and hearts against our sisters, brothers, and cousins in Christ who have been crying out for justice. It's not up to people of color to educate white people about how we in the Church have allowed ourselves to remain blissfully ignorant of our impact on others. That's our work.

In the last chapter of her book White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism, Robin DiAngelo (a white woman with decades of work as an academic, lecturer, author, and trainer on issues of racial and social justice) writes: "When white people ask me what to do about racism and white fragility, the first thing I ask is, 'What has enabled you to be a full, educated, professional adult and not know what to do about racism?" It is a sincere question. How have we managed to not know, when the information is all around us? When people of color have been telling us for years? If we take that question seriously and map out all the ways we have come to not know what to do, we will have our guide before us. For example, if my answer is that I was not educated about racism, I know that I will have to get educated. If my answer is that I don't know people of color, I will need to build relationships. If it is because there are no people of color in my environment, I will need to get out of my comfort zone and change my environment; addressing racism is not without effort." (p.144)

Reconciling Works (the organization where our Affirmation of Welcome to LGBTQ+ folks is registered) is asking all of its member congregations to update that Affirmation to include specific commitments around anti-racist education and advocacy. Lent is the perfect time to begin our work together and individually. This season of repentance and reflection prepares us to live more fully into our identity as Children of God. Jesus cautions us: "Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye... You hypocrite! first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor's eye." (Matthew 7:3,5)

What we have begun is holy, if hard, work. The good news is that we don't have to do this alone. Jesus has gone ahead of us, loving us exactly as we are, and will lead us into the shalom of the Beloved Community.

Are you tired of feeling helpless in the face of bullying, disconnection, and the fear of violence? Do you care about the children and youth in our communities? Does the economic impact of violence seem like a tragic waste to you?

And if there was an effective solution, would you want to be part of it?

The <u>Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP)</u> curriculum has a 48 year track record of reducing incidents of violence in prisons, between gang members, in schools, and in war-torn communities around the world. The magistrates who went out with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in South Africa post-apartheid were trained in AVP. Hutus and Tutsis in Rwanda were brought together post-genocide and found healing in community together. White supremacists have repudiated that hate-filled ideology after one three-day AVP workshop. A school in Philadelphia went from 135 police call-outs to only 15 incidents the following year after all staff went through AVP workshops over the summer.

Sounds too good to be true? Well, this may be the one case where the reality is actually **better** than the hype! We all want to see a positive momentum shift in our schools, families, workplaces, houses of worship, and neighborhoods. This is your chance to make a real difference.

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For whom? This workshop is designed for participants from 15 to 95 years of age. Students, educators, parents, community leaders, healthcare workers, social workers, school staff or administrators, concerned neighbors, first responders....anyone who wants to gain de-escalation skills, learn about yourself, and help build a healthier, more trusting and trustworthy community.

Dates? Tues-Wed-Thurs April 4-6 OR Wed-Thurs-Fri April 12-14

Times? 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Attire? Wear comfortable clothes and shoes – you'll be moving around a fair amount!

Food? We'll provide refreshments in the morning and afternoon. Plan on bringing your own sack lunch.

Cost? Suggested donation of \$60. But if you cannot afford that, pay what you can – money will never be an obstacle. If you can afford more, your contribution will help underwrite others' participation!

Style? This is an experiential workshop of increasingly more intense communication exercises, punctuated with "Light and Livelies" to get you laughing together. You won't be sitting through long lectures – just enough to set the stage and share some important information along the way.

Religion? This is NOT a religious program, and there will be no proselytizing, even though it's held at a church.

Inclusivity? We are committed to the principles of diversity, equity and inclusion. Mutual respect reigns.

Partial participation? Participants are strongly encouraged to commit to the entire workshop; we are building community, and your full presence is requested. We also understand that emergencies are, well...emergent!

Covid protocols? While not required, we strongly encourage you to be fully vaccinated and in good health each day. Masks are not required but are welcomed and provided.


